FORESTRY IS ON THE LEADING EDGE OF TECHNOLOGY

FORESTRY GROWS OUR ECONOMY

ENVIRONMENTAL COORDINATOR ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT SYSTEMS COORDINATOR

Forestry is a sustainable industry, and you ensure it operates accordingly.

- What you need: Bachelor's Degree or Technical Diploma in Environmental Science
- Where you get it: University of Alberta, University of Calgary
- Average salary: \$66,265.00 to \$110,381.00

GRADER

Lumber eagerly await your critical eye and approval. They want to become structural lumber for family homes and many other products that must meet strict building code requirements – and you're the one who determines their future.

- What you need: A Grade Certificate is required, which can be achieved by attending the Alberta Forest Products Association Grading School
- Average salary: \$28.59 to \$46.78 an hour

GIS SPECIALIST

Do you live and breathe technology and geography? Combine your innate sense of direction with computer-based Geographical Information Systems (GIS) to create, maintain, and analyze information in maps and databases.

- What you need: Diploma or Degree in Geography, Forestry or Science with a strong background in computer science and remote sensing
- Where you get it: Lethbridge College, Northern Alberta Institute of Technology, Olds College, Southern Alberta Institute of Technology, University of Lethbridge, University of Alberta, University of Calgary
- Average salary: \$82,211.00

REGISTERED PROFESSIONAL FORESTER/ REGISTERED PROFESSIONAL FOREST TECHNOLOGIST (RPFT)

You are passionate about the health and longevity of Alberta's public forests. As an forester or forest Technologist, you create forest plans and make them come to life.

- What you need: Bachelor's Degree in Forestry or Diploma in Forest Technology. Outdoor experience recommended
- Where you get it: University of Alberta or Northern Alberta Institute of Technology (NAIT). Program can be started at Northern Lakes College or Portage College. Alberta Junior Forest Rangers provides work related forestry experience
- Average salary: \$92,005.00

INDIGENOUS RELATIONS LIAISON

Cross-cultural understanding between people of Indigenous and non-Indigenous origin is important to you. As an Indigenous Relations Liaison, you help build and maintain effective relationships and cultural understanding between the forest industry and the Indigenous peoples and communities. You will work in partnership with the 50 nations and nine Métis Settlements across the province. You recognize the importance of Indigenous peoples' strong connection to the land, as well as the cultural uniqueness of Alberta's vibrant Indigenous communities.

- What you need: Degree in Business, Education, Human Ecology, Humanities, Languages, Social Science, Law, Religious Studies or Native Studies
- Where you get it: Various universities and colleges in Alberta. Most roles require a combination of education and experience
- Average salary: \$62,124.00

PRODUCT TECHNICIAN

TIMBER SCALER

You love the outdoors, timber and how the two size up. You have the ability to keep your numerical and computer skills sharp.

- What you need: No formal education required. However, forest education is valued and Registered Professional Forester (RPFs) and Registered Professional Forest Technician (RPFTs) certifications are available
- Where you get it: Association of Alberta Forest Management Professionals
- Average salary: \$68,069.00

SILVICULTURE CONTRACTOR

Silviculture is all about maintaining the growth, structure, and quality of forests. That means you're passionate about the environment and prefer to spend your summers being at one with nature and your winters waging war against the pine beetles. There are many job titles, but you could be a tree planter, regeneration surveyor, herbicide applicator, or cone picker.

- What you need: No formal education required. Many are Registered Professional Forest Technicians with training
- Average salary: \$39.57 an hour

INSTRUMENT TECHNICIAN

Do you have strong troubleshooting abilities, problem solving skills, and meticulous attention to detail? Instrument technician could be the career path for you.

- What you need: Either a registered apprenticeship, journeyperson certification or recognized trade certificate
- Where you get it: Alberta Apprenticeship and Industry Training. Training offered at Grande Prairie Regional College, Lakeland College in Vermilion, Northern Alberta Institute of Technology (NAIT), Red Deer College, Southern Alberta Institute of Technology (SAIT)
- Average salary: \$44.78 an hour

HEAVY DUTY MECHANIC

Skidders, processor and loader, and chippers are just some of the sophisticated, and aptly named, equipment that you're the master of.

- Where you get it: Find a suitable employer who is willing to hire and train an apprentice. Training offered at Grande Prairie Regional College, Keyano College in Fort McMurray, Northern Alberta Institute of Technology (NAIT), Red Deer College, Southern Alberta Institute of Technology (SAIT)
- Average salary: Millwright \$42.93 an hour. Pipefitter \$40.55 an hour

PLUMBER

You are mechanically inclined, agile, and strong. Piping is what you know, and plumbing is what you love.

- What you need: Either a registered apprenticeship, journeyperson certification or recognized trade certificate, plus related training
- Where you get it: Alberta Apprenticeship and Industry Training
- Average salary: \$36.28 an hour
